Belarus is still badly effected by the accident at the nuclear power plant at Chernobyl, Ukraine in 1986. The accident has had a negative impact on the health of the people inhabiting the contaminated territories.

The Friends of Chernobyl's Children (FOCC) work ecumenically through Churches, schools, friends and other organisations to bring children to England from Belarus for short periods so that they can experience being out of the contaminated area and can benefit from improved health as a result.

Several big-hearted local volunteers have been actively involved in improving these childrens lives for a number of years.
